

St. Mark's was one of Richard Upjohn's two major projects west of the Mississippi. He also commissioned Trinity Wall Street.

#### San Antonio builder John H. Kampmann was the contractor for St. Mark's






The most distinctive feature for St. Mark's was the design for the broad windows.

The wide nave windows were proportioned openings for wooden panels that could pivot open for extra ventilation during the hot summers.





In 1860, services were held in an upper room of the three-story Masonic Hall on Soledad Street.



The walls of St. Mark's appear basically as they did when work stopped for lack of funds in 1860.



The Fourth Michigan Infantry band provided music for an event held by the St. Mark's Dorcas Society in November 1865.



The parish's first major memorial, given in 1871, was the marble baptismal font.





St. Mark's was completed in 1875 by New York architect Richard Upjohn.




St. Mark's church bell was cast from a cannon found on the grounds of the Samuel Maverick homestead near the outer walls of the Alamo.

Dean Richardson stands near the altar before a memorial service for Queen Victoria in 1901.




This communion set, still in use, was dedicated in 1892.






#### This processional cross was dedicated in 1892 along with the communion set.

Dean Richardson was interred beneath a tablet in the chancel floor to the left of the altar.




Dean Richardson stands at the altar rail, surrounded by decorative lettering and ceiling designs he stenciled.



A parish hall with an auditorium, a balcony adaptable for Sunday School rooms, and a gymnasium, was finished in 1913.

Sunday dinners were served to soldiers in the parish hall for nearly two years during the World War I era.





Arthur H. Muir was the coach of the Sunday School League Champions from 1916-1918 and again in 1922.

One-story commercial building with baroque Spanish Colonial Revival facade was built next to St. Mark's in the 1920s.






